Bishop O'Neill, from Colorado, used to say, "My first job is to be a person of prayer. If I don't do that, nothing else of what I do will be done half as well." I think about that a lot. I've tried to follow his model and example.

Add to that list the importance of stopping every once in a while, opening up to God in a new way, slowing down long enough to listen to the Holy Spirit, or reading for the pure pleasure of it. Even good old fashioned boredom and "doing nothing" have their necessary place in the life of faith and creativity.

Perhaps I'm preaching not just to myself but to you as well. Life has been particularly pitched and difficult the past few years. We need to learn to slow down, check in with ourselves and others, and be deliberate about our pace.

Church people like to say that "God is in the details." We often think that means what we produce, make, or distribute. But perhaps God is equally in the details of these long, languishing days of summer when nothing in particular is expected and we can be open to hearing in new ways.

Last Spring, I gave our Assistant Priest, Rev. John Bullock, a time of sabbatical for the summer. John had asked for the time away because he felt a need to drop back, pray, and consider how God might next be calling him to live out his vocation as a father, attorney, and priest.

I met with Father John recently and heard of his discernment over the preceding months. He described a process that has been rich and productive. Although he has loved all he has done with Grace Cathedral, John is still actively discerning how God is calling him to serve in light of the other commitments in his life.

We can all identify with this at some level. John is a highly-talented professional whose services are in demand. Fifty- and sixty-hour weeks are not uncommon for him, plus the fact that he has two boys and time with them is precious. It was our common discernment that he should be able to serve the most pressing needs in his life.

Where exactly does this leave us here at Grace Cathedral? We're going to miss John a lot, but we'll be fine. I feel the Holy Spirit's directing hand pressing us to place faith and trust in God. 
