



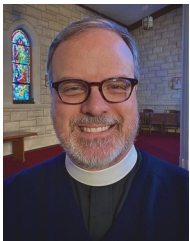

## *From the Dean*



The earliest date on which Advent can start is November 27<sup>th</sup>. In 2022, this will be the case.

Your Thanksgiving leftovers will still be cooling in the

fridge from just three days before!

To the calendar, of course, it makes no difference; but to those who observe, it may feel that Advent is being rushed upon us. So I want you to have something to hold onto that will help ease you into the season.

This year I'm offering *Holy Is His Name* as a daily devotions guide for Advent. This book by Elis Hiu-Mei Lui (a youth minister in the Diocese of New York) uses the four canticles (hymns of praise) found in the Gospel of Luke as a framework. Here is a sample, drawn from a meditation on the Song of Simeon: "When we, each of us, live as the one whom we were created to be, it is infectious. God's delight in us is infectious. There is a reason why the Christian tradition is full of communal practices, passed on from community to community, generation to generation. None of us light the candle alone. The salt of the earth is to be tasted. The light of Christ at the center of our lives is to be shared."

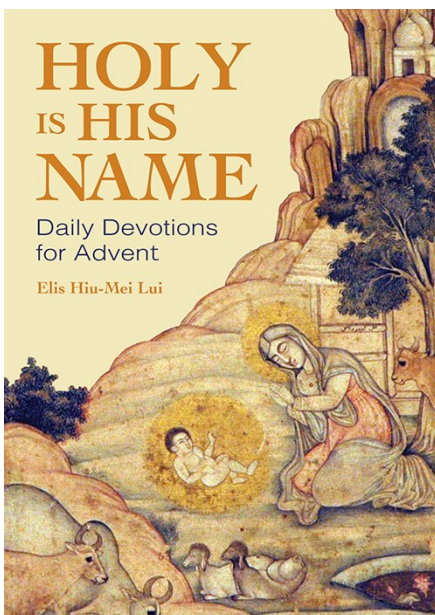
## From the Dean
