From the Dean



God places a claim on each and every one of us from the beginning. That claim has specific dimensions and purposes. It can be

thought of as a "calling" or a "call." Our job as God's people is to find out what that is for us so that we can pursue it. It might evolve over the years and become different things, but throughout our lives, we're meant to remain sensitive and responsive to what God is doing and what God is asking us to do.

Among the signs of a healthy congregation, you may find people in varying, active states of discernment about how they are called to serve God. Some are discerning a formal call to holy orders while others are asking themselves what they might be called to within their own lay vocations. But *all* are called – so the fact that others are pursuing the question does not mean there's no room for you to do the same thing! If anything, it should be a sign of encouragement.

In the Episcopal tradition, the exploration of the question cannot occur in a vacuum. It necessarily requires the generous, compassionate talents of fellow Christians in one's community in order to come to the clearest

possible understanding. We ask what God is up to in the Holy Spirit, and we do that together, being careful to use the wisdom of those around us who hold us gently as we discern. It is vulnerable work. Often the answer is not what we were expecting, and that might include the word "no." That can be discouraging, but it's not the end of the question – in fact, plenty of times it turns out to be simply the beginning of a new phase of discernment. It begs for deep patience.

When a sense of calling begins to articulate itself and others have affirmed it, we understandably respond by asking, "What now?" The answer is different for each circumstance, but usually the call is to something that's a bit bigger than what we already know – so there may be training we need, or special relationships to cultivate, or books to read, or a time to retreat from our usual schedules and offer contemplation and prayer. We do whatever's required.

To be sure, discernment is not just about people becoming deacons, priests, or bishops. That's important and it has its place, but a big part of the reason why clergy exist in the first place is to help guide you to your own understanding of how you are called to serve Christ in his church, with or without a clerical collar.

Once more: You have a call. God has called you to *something*.

If you feel tugged in a certain direction, or if you just want to explore the question, I'm around and available for prayerful and confidential conversation.


