



From the Dean




It seems the crocuses come earlier each year. Here we are, minding our own business, still bent by winter winds,

and that perennial, purple sign of spring pops out. The fact that it's too cold to enjoy the outdoors doesn't really occur to them. They just come on out and play.

The prophet Isaiah has something to say about the crocus as a harbinger. In chapter 35, he likens it to the desert wasteland: "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and shouting."

Scholars date that consoling passage to a period of about 2,500 years ago, when the people of Judah were in exile in Babylon and dreaming of being able to return to their homeland someday soon. With the idea of return within sight, the better poets of the day were provoked. Something was about to happen.

Christians are a people who live in the tension of "the now and the not-yet." We straddle the line between what we can see and know now, and what is up ahead, beyond our ability to divine. We are also a people who, with respect to the future, exercise virtuous hope and

anticipation. This means our thoughts of the future are not to be blinded by poisonous pessimism. As God inspires the writer of the Letter of James to express, so might we concur: "the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy."


What happened to you this year when you walked out of the desert of Lent and into the promised fulfillment of Easter? Has something blossomed for you? What does it look like? What has God done for you?



THE SUNDAY OF THE PASSION: PALM SUNDAY, APRIL 2, 8:30 & 10:30 A.M.

On **Palm Sunday**, we'll mark the first day of Holy Week focusing on Jesus' triumphal entry in to Jerusalem. A dramatic reading of the Passion narrative will follow. *Childrare at 10:30*.

MONDAY AND TUESDAY IN HOLY WEEK, APRIL 3 & 4, 5:30 P.M.

On **Monday and Tuesday**, we will gather in St. Mary's Chapel for Evening Prayer at **5:30**. The service will include a homily.

WEDNESDAY IN HOLY WEEK, APRIL 5, 7:30 P.M.

Wednesday in Holy Week is Tenebrae (the service of shadows). The most conspicuous feature of this service is the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights in the church until only a single candle (the light of Christ) remains. The service is at **7:30 p.m.**

MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 6, 6 P.M. AGAPE MEAL, 7 P.M. SERVICE

The beginning of what the church calls the *Triduum Sacrum* (the "sacred three days" of Holy Week: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday). Our tradition is an "Agape Meal"—a covered dish supper—on **Thursday** at **6 p.m.** (please bring a dish to share for this dinner) followed by a Eucharist at **7 p.m.** Footwashing and the stripping of the altar are part of this dramatic service. The all-night Prayer Watch begins after the Maundy Thursday service and ends at noon on Good Friday. People are asked to keep vigil for one hour during that time period. A sign-up sheet will be located in the Cathedral. More than one person can sign up for the same hour. There will be building security during the night.

GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 7, 12:10 AND 7 P.M.

The Proper Liturgy for Good Friday is celebrated on **Friday** at **12:10 and 7 p.m.** The noon service will be followed by the Stations of the Cross.

HOLY SATURDAY, APRIL 8, 9 A.M.

Holy Saturday is a day we rest and reflect on Christ's sacrifice and saving work, even as he rests in the tomb. We gather in the garden at **9 a.m.**, where the blessed sacrament (the body of Christ) has been placed until his resurrection on Easter Day morning. This brief service (about 15 minutes) recalls the ancient tradition of mourning called sitting *Shiva*, or sitting with the dead.

EASTER DAY, APRIL 9, 6:45, 8:30 & 10:30 A.M.

On **Easter Morning**, we will have three services: a Sunrise Service at 6:45 a.m., a spoken service of Holy Communion at 8:30, and a Festal Celebration of Easter Day at 10:30 with the Cathedral choir and organ. Incense will be used at the 10:30 service. Breakfast will be served in All Saints Hall between the 8:30 and 10:30 services. *Childcare available at 10:30*.
