### From the Dean



Year by year, when I see kids coming into the church parking lot in their Halloween costumes at the annual Trunk Or

Treat, it reminds me of a story.

A dozen or more years ago, I served a church that had a Trunk Or Treat. One year we didn't have a lot of "customers" at first, so I went knocking on doors to see if I could wrangle some kids who'd come and agree to scare us in exchange for candy.

In that neighborhood (similar in many respects to the neighborhood around Grace Cathedral), you would get the most interesting range of responses. Typically someone would ask "Who is it?" in a tired and skeptical voice. I'd answer through the door that I was from the church, and a few seconds later a cautious face would be looking back at me through a space in the door blocked by a security chain. I'd explain my mission, then there would be this slackening in the eyes of the person – the defenses not so thick.

"Yeah, okay. Thanks." Or, "I don't have kids, but they do next door." Or, "Appreciate it. I'll send 'em over."


learned to be wary of knocks on the door. A knock on the door can come at any time from anyone and be about anything. In this time, when people are so private in their living, a knock on the door can bring bad news from strangers – unwelcome salespersons, irate landlords, bill collectors, process-servers holding summonses. Usually someone wants something from you – isn't interested in giving you something with no strings attached. Any little instance of real connection should be cherished.

I only tell this tale to relate this fact: when folks heard the name of that particular church being invoked, they let up, became less defensive, and showed interest in what we had to offer. In other words, when I knocked on the door, if I'd said my name it wouldn't have meant anything. Instead, I invoked the name of the church, and that quite literally opened doors for me. I was able to trade on the positive aspects of that congregation that had been earned and developed over the years.

Seems no matter where I go or who I talk to, I often encounter people with a strong sense about Grace Cathedral. Whether by personal experience or reputation, the positive connotations come out and we can get deeper faster. I believe we are a trusted entity with years of service to the community to prove it.

Knowing that people hold this congregation in high regard helps us know that we can accomplish a lot of important things together.

featuring Kitty Fapp

Kitty Fapp and her husband Ross and their children (Robert, Shawn Marie, and Chris) came to Grace Cathedral in 2000. As a librarian at Shawnee Public Library at the time, the hours of worship were more accessible given her work schedule. Coming to Grace, she continued in her passion of teaching Sunday School. She



currently teaches kindergarten through third grade, and has worked extensively with children of all ages and with young adults. She writes her own lesson plans and has developed several VBS programs. Kitty served as the Christian Education Director at St. David's for 14 years and at Grace Cathedral for 9 years.

Kitty's leadership in education is demonstrated by her board positions in the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. She serves on the Youth and Campus Ministry

board, the Children's Ministry board, and the St. Francis Board for the Kansas State Canterbury House. She is a mentor for the Canterbury House campus ministries at the University of Kansas and at Kansas State University. She started making cookies for Valentine Day for both the Canterbury Houses in 2006. This advanced to making dinners for both houses several times a year. She helps these young adults with program planning around topics such as coping in the university, bullying, and LGBTQ issues, as well as individually assisting with the discernment process as students prepare for the next step in their adult lives.

Kitty is instrumental in the Miqra program offered by the Diocese. In this program, junior and high school youth read the entire bible. She also participates in Happening, an annual three-day event where high school students relive the last three days of Jesus' life. Kitty's additional program involvement is with the summer camp, MEGA Camp, held the first week of June. She had 10 freshman girls in her cabin this past summer and says it was a joyous, exciting experience without drama.

Clearly adored by her students

(as evidenced by the lifelong connections she has made with many of them), Kitty helps make the readings come alive in all areas



she teaches. She is committed to having students visually see the purpose of the parable or stories. Her talent and training as an artist – pen and ink, watercolor, oil painting – help achieve this goal. She was an art major in her undergraduate education and is an accomplished artist. She frequently works on consignment and has displayed her work at a variety of venues, including the Cloister Gallery at Grace Cathedral in 2018.

Her classroom activities typically include visual arts, with students creating works of art that exemplify the story being discussed. She also is skilled in storytelling, and has an activity called "What's in a name?" She has identified 80 names for Jesus, and a recent lesson focused on Jesus as cornerstone. Discussion of this led to a student exploration of the

grounds of Grace Cathedral to identify the three cornerstones of the cathedral and learn their history. (Can you name the three cornerstones of Grace?)

In addition to her work with Sunday School and the special programs of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Kitty serves as a Eucharistic Minister. Although Sunday School goes until 11 a.m., she is able to slide into that role without difficulty. She says she watches the entire service online at a later time.

When asked if there are other ministries she would like to explore in the future, Kitty replied that she would like to establish a program with post high school and young adults looking for community building that would help other programs at Grace Cathedral. The group would meet for fellowship, prayer and Bible Study as well as fun activities like cooking, art classes and outdoor activities. This is an area Grace will be exploring as its strategic development process continues to roll forward.

Kitty has multiple talents, including sewing, making jam, and brightening the days of the people with whom she interacts. Kitty is a whirlwind of activity and smiles.
