



From the Dean



Dear friends,

In 2024, Easter Sunday will fall on March 31. If that seems a bit early to you, know that you're not alone.

If you go to pages 882-883 in your *Book of Common Prayer*, you'll see "A Table to Find Easter Day." In this remarkable document there's a big span of years, 1900-2089. Within that range of 189 years, Easter only happens 41 times in March, or about 21% of the time. (Bonus: during that same span, Easter only falls on March 31 3% of the time.)

For the uninitiated, those statistics I just rattled off are simply numbers. But to those who know who've been through it – Easter Sunday is so much more than the month it occurs in. When I look at those pages in my prayer book, I'm seeing the grand narrative of Lent, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, the Vigil, and finally Easter Sunday all being played out across a few columns. My eyes may see rows of dates, but my heart and my mind are busy remembering the drama, the passion, and the tears. All of it with Jesus Christ as its central focus.

It makes my 51 years on this earth seem pretty humble by comparison, my 30 years as an Episcopalian humbler still!

Living the pattern of life from Lent to Easter has become a bedrock part of my identity as a Christian. I owe it to the liturgical traditions for saving my sanity and giving me a way to know God in a completely new way – and all at a critical moment in my life as a person trying to find a more mature faith.

I hope that this finds you well as we all practice and live Lent together and individually. May you find what you need in this holy season.

Blessing Box Sunday, March 17





THE SUNDAY OF THE PASSION: PALM SUNDAY MARCH 24, 8:30 & 10:30 A.M.

On **Palm Sunday**, we'll mark the first day of Holy Week focusing on Jesus' triumphal entry in to Jerusalem. A dramatic reading of the Passion narrative will follow. *Childcare at 10:30*.

MONDAY AND TUESDAY IN HOLY WEEK MARCH 25 & 26, 5:30 P.M.

On **Monday and Tuesday**, we will gather in St. Mary's Chapel for Evening Prayer at **5:30**. The service will include a homily.

WEDNESDAY IN HOLY WEEK, MARCH 27, 7:30 P.M.

Wednesday in Holy Week is Tenebrae (the service of shadows). The most conspicuous feature of this service is the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights in the church until only a single candle (the light of Christ) remains. The service is at **7:30 p.m.**

MAUNDY THURSDAY, MARCH 28, 6 P.M. AGAPE MEAL, 7 P.M. SERVICE

The beginning of what the church calls the *Triduum Sacrum* (the "sacred three days" of Holy Week: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday). Our tradition is an "Agape Meal"—a covered dish supper—on **Thursday** at **6 p.m.** (please bring a dish to share for this dinner) followed by a Eucharist at **7 p.m.** Foot and hand-washing, and the stripping of the altar are part of this dramatic service. The all-night Prayer Watch begins after the Maundy Thursday service and ends at noon on Good Friday. People are asked to keep vigil for one hour during that time period. A sign-up sheet will be located in the Cathedral. More than one person can sign up for the same hour. There will be building security during the night.

GOOD FRIDAY, MARCH 29, 12:10 AND 7 P.M.

The Proper Liturgy for Good Friday is celebrated on **Friday** at **12:10 and 7 p.m.** The noon service will be followed by the Stations of the Cross.

HOLY SATURDAY, MARCH 30, 9 A.M.

Holy Saturday is a day we rest and reflect on Christ's sacrifice and saving work, even as he rests in the tomb. We gather in the garden at **9 a.m.**, where the blessed sacrament (the body of Christ) has been placed until his resurrection on Easter Day morning. This brief service (about 15 minutes) recalls the ancient tradition of mourning called sitting *Shiva*, or sitting with the dead.

EASTER DAY, MARCH 31, 6:45, 8:30 & 10:30 A.M.

On **Easter Morning**, we will have three services: a Sunrise Service at 6:45 a.m., a spoken service of Holy Communion at 8:30, and a Festal Celebration of Easter Day at 10:30 with the Cathedral choir and organ. Incense will be used at the 10:30 service. Breakfast will be served in All Saints Hall between the 8:30 and 10:30 services. *Childcare available at 10:30*.

Fellowship Committee or Hospitality Committee?

What is in a name? On the Grace Episcopal website, we identify the Fellowship Committee as the group "responsible for planning, promoting and implementing meal and fellowship events for the Cathedral community. Annual events include Easter Sunday breakfast, the Pentecost Picnic, Sundae Sunday, ... and more."

Enthusiastically led by Jenelle Carkhuff for several years, the Fellowship Committee changed leadership around 2006-7 with coleadership of Nicole Nielsen, Carolyn Jones, and Jan Irby. At the time of transition, the name was changed from fellowship to hospitality committee. The thought was that hospitality implied more

implies gathering of people with similar interests and relationship development, hospitality provides for welcoming guests and making them feel comfortable. So hospitality sets the stage for fellowship to happen.

Opportunities to experience fellowship with fellow parishioners are critical to spiritual development and to the life of the church. As Jan Irby states, "being a member of Grace certainly involves the religious part, but also the heart part." Fellowship with others provides this. We meet others with similar interests,



varying talents, and unique perspectives. This leads to enhancement of religious understanding, service opportunities and participation, and friendships.

Nicole Nielsen is now the chair of the Hospitality
Committee. Her catering experience and love of baking has made the Hospitality Committee a natural fit for her talents. She enjoys socializing, meeting a variety of people, exchanging new recipes and sharing traditions around food. The Hospitality Committee welcomes new members, and emphasizes that help is always appreciated, especially during holiday times. She makes it very clear that baking

is not necessary to participate: fruit, granola bars and grocery store treats are appreciated. Setting up and cleaning up are particularly valuable skills to share.

March will be a particularly busy month with Birthday celebrations (March 3), Mothering Sunday (March 10), Maundy Thursday (March 28), and Easter brunch (March 31).

The Hospitality Committee provides snacks for coffee hour following the 10:30 service on the first Sunday of each month. The coffee hour snacks are provided by "Sam's Club" on the third Sunday and by the Daughters of the King on the fifth Sunday. This leaves the second and fourth Sundays to be hosted by congregation



members or various ministry groups. Just sign up on the poster in the Commons Room. Hint to various groups: this would be a great way to highlight your

Captain Morgan's Oatmeal -Raisin Cookies (variation of Betty Crocker's recipe), courtesy of Nicole Nielsen

½ cup granulated sugar
½ cup packed brown sugar
½ cup butter, softened
½ cup shortening
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

2 eggs

3 cups quick-cooking or old fashioned oats

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup raisins - soaked in Captain Morgan Spiced Rum (put raisins in a bowl, cover with the rum, microwave for 1-2 minutes until plump) - drain liquid. For an alcoholfree version, use the same technique to pump raisins using cola instead of rum.

Optional: Add 1 cup chopped nuts and/or chocolate chips

Cinnamon-sugar mixture: 4 tablespoons granulated sugar and 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

Directions:

Heat oven to 375. In a large bowl, beat all ingredients except oats, flour and raisins with an electric mixer on medium speed, or mix with a spoon. Stir in oats, flour and raisins.


Make rounded tablespoon size balls, roll in cinnamon-sugar, and place on an ungreased cookie sheet about 2 inches apart.

Bake for 9 to 11 minutes or until light brown. Immediately remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Makes about 36 cookies.
