



From the Dean




Dear friends,
Easter is about the triumph of God's redeeming love over the forces of death and evil.
Jesus was killed

through violent means. Therefore, when we accept and trust in the saving work of Christ, which crucially includes his resurrection from death, we also accept and trust that we must do whatever we can to live nonviolent lives.

What does this mean? Well, it means at least three things.

First, accepting Jesus' resurrection means rejecting the narrative we find all around us that violence is an expedient cure for whatever ails us. The more attention I pay, the more I find people ready to use violence and cruelty as an answer for things they have chosen not to engage with or taken the time to understand. Looking beyond the commonalities we all share, they become fixated on hurting those who are not like them in some way they deem as irreconcilable. However, as the author of Ephesians says, "We have not so learned Christ."

The second point is a natural extension of the first. Christians are obligated to study the Scriptures and prayerfully seek out a real sense of how Jesus interacts with those

with whom he comes in contact, as well as what he teaches in his sermons. For example, in Matthew 5, he exhorts his listeners to practice a level of nonviolence that still seems like a stretch to me: "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you: Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also, and if anyone wants to sue you and take your shirt, give your coat as well, and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile." Is Jesus teaching here in the abstract, being hyperbolic to make a point, or does he mean what he says? I think we have to reckon with the latter as the stronger possibility – that he means it – and not let ourselves off the hook.

If we let the Jesus of Scripture be our guide, sooner or later we will come up against my third and most crucial point, which is that this cannot be just an exercise in looking outside ourselves. Every one harbors violent thoughts and intentions. Trusting in God means finding new ways to see and be in the world and laying aside our old, violent patterns and habits.

About the window...

Each month, we feature a small portion of a Cathedral stained glass window on the front cover of *The Chimes*. The rose window above the Resurrection window has a stylized version of flowers which have acquired religious significance - Tri-form leaf (purity of the Virgin); shamrocks (the Trinity); quatrefoil (four major prophets); a many-petaled blossom (innocence of the Christ Child); and "spiky" forms (crowns of lilies) - all inspiriting meditation upon the glory of God in nature.

Who: Young people in grades 3-12 for 2023-24 school year (you must have *finished* third grade to attend)



Daughters of the King

The Order of the Daughters of the King in an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it. It includes women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran and Roman Catholic traditions.

Members undertake a Rule of Life, incorporating the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service. By reaffirmation of the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a lifelong program of prayer, service and evangelism, dedicated to the spread of Christ's Kingdom and strengthening of the spiritual life of her parish.

The Order of the Daughters of the King is organized as a religious order, although we do not live in an enclosed community. Each Daughter takes a lifetime vow to live by the Rule of the Order. Our Rule of Life requires a spiritual discipline of daily prayer, service and evangelism. Because of our vow, we refer to ourselves as an

order, not as an organization.

At Grace Cathedral our members dedicate themselves to the Rule of Life. We meet monthly on the first Saturday of the month, "check in" with one another, offer prayers for ourselves and our parish, serve the parish by providing refreshments for funeral receptions, continue the flower ministry to those in need or as a way of saying thanks to the parish and contribute monthly to the Blessing Bags and Outreach Ministry.

The Motto of the Order is:

For His Sake...

I am but one, but I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something.

What I can do, I ought to do. What I ought to do, by the grace of God I will do.

Lord, what will you have me do?







