



From the Dean

Dear friends,



Newcomers often ask how we determine what lessons from the Bible we are going to read on or preach from on Sundays. It's

a good question since many of us come from traditions where that is simply decided on by the individual pastor and there's often no way to know until you show up at church.

And that's the first thing to know: that these decisions are not happening in a vacuum, or just within the pastor's office. They're made at a broad level and disseminated so that Episcopalians churchwide can hear the same lessons being read and preached on. You can know far in advance what's coming up and be better prepared for it, and you can go into just about any Episcopal church on any Sunday and know what to expect.

If you look at page 888 of the *Book of Common Prayer*, you'll find an explanation of how all this works. In a nutshell, we divide our Sunday readings into cycles that last three years. There's no mystery here: we refer to them as years A, B, and C. Within each of these, the most important readings (think Easter, Christmas, Pentecost) are repeated every year. On pages 889-92 of the BCP, you'll see the lessons laid out year by year.

Each of the years A, B, and C has a different Gospel focus, with an order familiar to you if you ever had to learn

the books of the Bible. Year A is centered around the Gospel According to Matthew; Year B is heavy on the Gospel According to Mark; and the focus of Year C is the Gospel According to Luke. That just leaves the Gospel According to John, which is read during the seasons of Lent and Easter in all three years, and in Year B since Mark is shorter.

On Sundays we have a reading from the Old Testament, a Psalm, an Epistle, and a Gospel. Quite often the first three things on that list are chosen to accentuate or illuminate something about the chosen Gospel readings. But sometimes (and particularly with Epistles) we read serially from particular books of the Bible in chunks of a few weeks or even a month. This allows us to pray and preach on consistent content over a longer period.

I mentioned above that The Episcopal Church has decided on this concept, but the idea of listing out scriptures to be read on a given day goes back to at least the fifth century. "Lectionaries," as these lists are called, have been in use across many traditions and religions, often being used on a daily basis. In our own time (2006 to be exact), The Episcopal Church voted at its General Convention to adopt the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL), a widely-used resource favored by traditions such as Methodist, Lutheran, Reformed, American Baptist, and Nazarene. It put us into better conversation with these expressions of Christianity. The RCL tends to track pretty closely with what's already in our Prayer Book.
