

# From the Dean



Dear friends,

Let this be the first public mention I'm aware of concerning something pretty big: November

2025 will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the fire that consumed much of the interior of Grace Cathedral.

For the uninitiated, the fire began November 25, 1975, a Tuesday night two days prior to Thanksgiving. There was snow on the roads, and Cathedral Canon Robert Temple and Financial Secretary Dorothy Burgess were the only ones present for a service of Holy Eucharist in the chapel. According to an account made not long after, "To this day Miss Burgess wonders if she heard a door close in the empty Cathedral while she knelt [in the adjoining room] or whether it was her imagination." The two worshippers left around 6 p.m.; some time after, a fire was intentionally kindled in the Cathedral. At 12:39 a.m., the fire was spotted and the alarm sounded. Five hours later, firefighters had bravely contained the blaze, but the damage was done and the interior was more or less lost.

Recovery would run in stages, including a service celebrating restoration in 1978; but even in my

time as Dean, the large north window was finally replaced just last year with more stained glass. Until May of 2023, it had been only clear glass to replace what was lost that night in 1975 – the better part of five patient decades having passed.

The night of the fire continues to be a pivot point from which so much internal and local history is recounted. Even perfect strangers who have just learned what I do for a living are quick to point it out.

While this is undoubtedly a compelling tale, what I really hope to make clear is that this Cathedral community has continued on and continued to thrive well beyond the trappings of the fire story. We don't dwell in the past for its own sake. A chance to tell about the fire is a chance to tell about the fire is a chance to tell the world what happened *after* the fire, after the world's attention drifted on to other things. These are the moments of resolve that clarify a congregation's mission. And God is in the midst of it all.

So when we are mark this moment in our common story next year (and we will be careful to do so), I hope it won't be with too heavy a regret over what is lost and gone, but with a sense of celebration for what followed on: service, learning, worship, being a healing presence in our city and diocese.

Look for more information about our commemoration of these events over the next several months.

# NANCY PERRY'S LIFE of CARING

On September 20, Topeka will celebrate another Nancy Perry Day of Caring. This special volunteer event was established by the United Way to honor Nancy Perry, who served as the Director of the United Way for 25 years.

On this day (so popular it includes Thursday, September 19, as well), community volunteers will serve at a number of agencies to help with various projects. At Grace Cathedral, a group of youth from Robinson Middle School will paint one of the youth rooms, under the direction of their teachers and Kathy Smith, our Director of Children's Ministries.

Nancy's early passion was teaching kindergarten at Avondale East. Her long-term goal was to become a principal. Life offered different options, and she became "Miss Nancy" on "Romper Room" (1967-1971) and later, the host of the talk show *Noon Day with Nancy on KSNT*.



In 1983 she began her career at the United Way where she helped establish the "Imagination Library," where every child gets a free book from birth until age five. She shared a story of a father whose child was given a book for him to read to her. He said he was unable to read. A year later, he returned for the next year's book and announced that he had learned to read, and was thrilled to take the book home to read to his daughter.



Other youth programs developed/supported through the United Way included "Success by Six" and the "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program" through the YWCA. At the time, the United Way sought funding for 35 agencies to support community needs.

Nancy said it was a wonderful honor having her name attached to such an important day, since "usually these things happen after you pass away." That sense of honor extends to the entire Perry family (including husband Ken, daughter Anne and family and son Brad and family) participate in the event, annually providing services as a family of about 15 to a community project.

Nancy and Ken Perry joined Grace Cathedral over 55 years ago. They were raised in different Christian traditions (Nancy, Methodist and Ken, Catholic). After their marriage in 1963, they searched for a church that would fit both of them. When brought to the Cathedral by a friend, they fell in love with Grace, found a church home, and "never looked back."

Volunteerism is synonymous with Nancy Perry. At Grace Cathedral, Nancy currently serves on the Altar Guild, Finance Committee,


Hospitality Committee, and the Friday "Head Start" Sandwich Committee. She recently retired after serving for many years on the Diocesan Discernment Committee. Over her years at Grace, Nancy has been a vestry member and Senior Warden three times, a choir member, a Sunday school teacher with Ken, and a member of the Daughters of the King. She has also served as a leader for special events planning – after the fire in 1975, she helped

plan a fundraising gala that featured Bob Hope and fashion icon Edith Head. A fire sale was also a huge success.

Nancy says participating in ministries at Grace Cathedral and volunteerism in general offers an opportunity for fellowship with others. Getting to know others is clearly a source of great joy to Nancy. Her warmth, energy, adventurous spirit, and caring nature make it a great joy to know her!!
